### IDEAL PEOPLE NEEDED

The Zero Waste Heroes will be at it again at this year's Newtown Festival on Sunday March 5th and this year they're aiming for the stars! After last year's massive success of diverting 69% of Festival waste from landfill, the team are upping the game again, adding an extra three stations (to a total of 15), aiming to reach 90% diversion in 2017.

#### Want to make a big deposit in your karma bank?

To reach their goals, they need an even huger number of waste minimising wizards to help the public put their waste in the right place. This is where you come in...

#### There are two ways to volunteer.

- 1. Sign up individually as a volunteer by emailing zerowastenewtown@gmail.com or calling Renee at the Newtown Community Centre to sign up.
- 2. Organise a team to manage a waste station on the day! This could be you and your workmates, a group of neighbours on your street, your yoga class, soccer team or book club. We recommend about 8-10 people to stand in front of the waste station throughout the day, so that's 2 people at a time to cover 5 x 2 hour shifts. You'd be in charge of directing the public to use the correct bin to dispose of their Fair Day waste. If you're interested get in touch and we'll send you the details. There will be prizes for the team with the best diversion rate!!

We have been working hard to get some tasty rewards to thank you (and all your friends;-)) for your time. THANKS to Peoples Coffee & Ideal Cup for sussing us with a bag of coffee and an ideal cup for every volunteer! Legends! We've got a new project on the boil that we're excited about. At the Wash Against Waste (WAW) Station you will be able to borrow cutlery and crockery for FREE, so that you can munch your favourite Fair Day snacks right on down and avoid creating waste in the process! Once you're done, simply return the cutlery and crockery to the amazing assistants at the WAW Station - your dishes will be washed and sterilised with flare and style, ready for the next punters to borrow. If you're one of those onto it sorts and you plan to bring your reusable coffee cup on Fair Day, feel free to take it to the WAW Station for a quick wash up. You'll find the WAW Station on the Rintoul Street side of the Newtown Community Centre. There will be tables and chairs so you can sit and enjoy your lunch in style and let your senses be overtaken by the amazing whirl of the Newtown Festival all around. See you there!

#### A MESSAGE FROM THE NEWTOWN FESTIVAL ORGANISERS...

Come join us for that one special day of the year when the streets through central Newtown are closed and transformed into a World of Food and Music.

Our vibrant and colourful suburb hosts the biggest annual street fair and free music festival in New Zealand. Our streets are taken over by gourmet foodstalls, craft stalls and amazing performances. Over 75,000 people replace the daily 25,000 vehicles and 420 buses as the heart of Newtown becomes a carefully designed series of outdoor rooms, stages and precincts bringing together bands, buskers, circus performers, local retailers, community groups and stall holders from Wellington and all over New Zealand into an outdoor extravaganza.

This year we celebrate our 21st birthday with 112 acts performing on 14 stages.

The **Fairday programme** page displays a list of the stages and all the performers, parades and buskers. Click on the top of the column to sort by **Performer**, by **Time** or **Where**. You can find acts by name, see your favourite stage's line-up, or check out what is happening at any time of day right across the Festival.

One of the delights of the Fair is exploring, discovering stalls selling all manner of goods and mouth-watering international food, and now you can take a virtual tour of what's on offer. STALL FINDER: **newtownfestival.org.nz/stalls/** 

The Stalls page lists every stall, what they are selling and their site number. Stalls are grouped in Stall Blocks. Their site number gives you the Block zone where that stall is located. This page also lists the stages and other features for each Block. Search instructions [for phones and PC's] are at the very top of the page. Type in key words and then the page search will find all the matches. This page has the whole Festival – so you can find yummy treats to eat, cool things to buy or a stall (or a stage) by its name.

Use your phone on the day, or go online now and pre-plan your Festival.

This year the Tangata Whenua Stage moves into Riddiford Street at the south end (next to the much loved **free street sports and games** in Arney Street). The Filipino Village is back again at Saint Anne's, but this time with a combined Latino Stage at the end of Emmett Street. The Niceplace Curbside Cabaret has moved into Normanby Street. The Circus Rig with its amazing aerial performances is now in the end of Green Street. In Rintoul Street the stage is further up the road and is accompanied by an outdoor restaurant setting where the food-stalls are joined by public tables and chairs with free clean crockery and cutlery provided for you by the Wash Against Waste team!

A city is essentially the people who inhabit its buildings, streets, squares and parks. People bring a city alive, when they gather, celebrate and perform together in its streets our city becomes a thriving vibrant community!

Reclaim the streets, join in the day when we bring the world to Newtown, and showcase unique Newtown to the world!

## **BACKSTAGE PASS**

Emma Hall-Phillips gets the lowdown on James Lainchbury, Damian Jones and James Paul - stage managers for Renegade Bass and Niceplace Curbside Cabaret respectively.

#### **JAMES LAINCHBURY - RENEGADE BASS STAGE**

What's the name of your stage and it's vibe?

Renegade Bass. Unity and Niceness vibes..... Bass, Drums and Smiles all round!

This is your first year at Newtown Festival, welcome! What can audiences expect from the Renegade Bass stage?

People can expect to hear Roots dub and modern Dubstep/Bass music from "Eyes Down Sound" and 90's Jungle with a sprinkling of modern jungle styled tunes from the Momentum crew. Anyone new to these sounds will quickly be caught up in high energy nature of the music and immersed in the warmth of bass pressure!

You approached us with the idea of the Renegade Bass stage - what attracted you to Newtown Festival?

I love the Newtown Festival! I have been attending for 7 years now and have seen it grow and grow. I love the community spirit, the randomness and the free attitudes of the organisation, music, food, hosts and punters! There is nothing like what we at Momentum do anywhere else in NZ, and sharing that with the Newtown Festival audience feels right!

If you could have any DJ perform on your stage - who would it be and why? Local artist would be Aaron. He was a key figure in the scene in Auckland in the mid 90's, and quite possibly one of the best in our history of Jungle/DnB. He has not played in close to 20 years, and I am trying to rebuild the space to coax him out of retirement!

#### DAMIAN JONES & JAMES PAUL-MEOW & CAROLINE PRESENTS: NICE PLACE CURBSIDE CABARET STAGE

What's the name of your stage and it's vibe?

Nice Place Curbside Cabaret.

D: It's all just music, a sample of some of my favourite bands doing great things at the moment.

J: The vibe is underground indie rock/singer songwriter/equal rights/love.

It's really great to see a strong female presence on your lineup, was this something important for you to have?

Yes, it is something we are super conscious about when curating any line up. But at the end of the day the acts are amazing and their music speaks for itself no matter their gender, race, sexual identity.

Which act do people definitely have to make on the day? Girl boss or Draghound. No, Ida Lune or Eva! No - ya gotta see them all!!!

## **BACKSTAGE PASS**

#### **NEWTOWN NEW WORLD COMMUNITY STAGE**

CORNER OF RIDDIFORD AND CONSTABLE STREETS

Eryn Gribble chats with Andreas Lepper and gets the low-down on Sendam Rawkustra

Since 2003 the Newtown Community and Cultural Centre has wrangled up some talented and creative locals and put them on the "Newtown New World Community Stage". There have been many memorable moments over the years - Community Music Junctions 30 strong choir delivered an energetic and joyous performance rocking the stage (literally)! We've had the Wellington Medieval Guild showcasing Medieval instruments and interesting wares from ye time of old! It's always a mixed bag, and this year will be no different.

Percussion based group Sendam Rawkustra have been regular performers - they go with our stage like "Marmite goes with cheese" or "Fleetwood goes with Mac!" So I thought I'd have a yarn to drummer and facilitator of the group Andreas Lepper - a man that has only 9.5 fingers! When asked about his half-missing digit he smiles and replies he once got a bit too cheeky to a Samurai, from the glint in his eye - I'd believe it.

Andreas explains how his friend Kieran 'Mr Sterile Assembly' Monaghan was working as a mental health nurse and approached him with the idea to form a band for consumers of mental health services. The group of unrealised musicians soon to be "Sendam Rawkustra" were spending their time at a day centre The Club House on Horner street. The Club House provided a safe and non-judgemental space for folk who had past or current experiences of mental ill-health. They came up with the name as Sendam is madness - spelled incorrectly and backwards, and you only need to hear this act to understand why they are called a Rawkustra!

The compositions are dynamic improvisations on top of some generally agreed structure, but the music always shifts into an unexpected and often brilliant domain. It's raw, it's fluid and they play the best cover of Riders On The Storm from The Doors that you'll ever hear (and you'll never hear the same way twice!)

Sendam Rawkustra are celebrating their ten year anniversary, a huge achievement - most of all because they have continued to obtain funding (Dre' gives a shout-out to Well Health Trust!) The band has proven their resilience as they have shifted to over 5 different rehearsal venues after the sad closure of The Club House, played loads of gigs, had many lineup changes and even released a studio album "Who's mad?". In 2003 they also lost a long-time band mate and friend, Tim Bell.

I'm not sure if he's trying to butter me up, but when I ask what's the best gig they've ever played Andreas doesn't miss a beat - "Newtown Festival. Every time!"

"Take your pills. Read if you can. Shower if you must. Smoke all the time, red jersey, green jersey that is all!"

"I am not in physical pain. I have 8 pills a day. I've got some sort of faith. No one has it easy."

Rachel Miranda Evans has a chat with this month's Notorious Newtowner - Ray Tuffin.

I stand at the counter of Baobab deliberating tea flavours when Ray walks in. Our conversation begins, and I let out an internal sigh of relief. My no prepared questions approach feels perfect as this is a man who is clearly passionate about his work.

Ray Tuffin is the new Wellington City Council Community Liaison Advisor for Newtown. The role is the first of its kind and the model may be rolled out across other suburbs. He describes his job as being a connector between the council and the community and about knowing the right people to talk to. It's evident that he does. By the end of our conversation I feel as if I have been walked through a three-dimensional multi-stakeholder diagram that's simple, open, and ready for the kids to colour in!

I ask if he has a vision for Newtown. He replies that it's not about his vision, but that it's about the vision of the community. His work is to consult widely around how to spend the \$3 million that WCC has allocated for community facility upgrades. Issues that are being addressed include rubbish, vegetation and roading, a play area for children, as well as an "Eyes On" project to reduce retail theft. Through the process of consultation he wishes to broaden the scope and produce a 1-3 year community plan that would allow the council to budget for future community needs.

Based at 8 Constable Street, "Kia Ora Newtown" is purposefully not a 'Council building'. Ray welcomes a visit. A few locals have offered to volunteer at the space and he's excited about voices coming from within the community communicating the upgrade project. With an ethos of inclusion, Ray is asking "What do we have here? How can we use it? What's not being seen or understood and how can it be better utilised?"

Ray also speaks in depth of the other project in his life and this is where I see his passion truly light up. He coaches golf and his interest in working with kids with special needs is developing into a grander scheme to create an accessible sports club in Berhampore that would be the first of its kind in New Zealand.

It's almost time for him to depart for a day of back-to-back meetings down at Council HQ so I ask what he's looking forward to about the Newtown Festival. He likes that it's a chance to bring everyone together and witness the multiculturalism of our community. Hoping for a clincher, I ask what band he's most looking to seeing... but he seems as pleasantly overwhelmed about the line-up as I am!

### **NEWTOWN COMMUNITY & CULTURAL CENTRE (rulz)**

It's that time of year that we celebrate all things Newtown - including the self-proclaimed jewel in the suburb's crown, the Newtown Community & Cultural Centre. If you don't already know about all the great things that take place here, then a) where have you been?!, and b) get the heck over here already! Or failing that, at least cast your eyes over our little run-down of some of the things running at the centre...

YOGA AND MORE YOGA (AND OTHER EXERCISE CLASSES): Love getting your downward facing dog on, but don't really love shelling out 15 bucks a time to do it? Come along to the community centre's community exercise classes, where qualified and experienced tutors lead you through yoga sessions, tai chi classes and step aerobics workouts, all for just \$2 a pop! Classes include: Body Strengthening, Mon 9.30am; Tai chi advanced, Tues 10am; Baby friendly yoga, Tues 10am; Yoga & chai, Thurs 10am; Tai chi beginners, Fri 10am. For yoga enthusiasts, there are additional yoga classes which run for koha on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday evenings, as well as on Tuesday mornings. Check out our timetable for details.

**SPACE FOR HIRE:** we manage three different buildings and in total 7 different rooms and halls, all for use by the community! Spaces include a mirrored dance studio, meeting rooms, and a community theatre. If you need a space to host a private function, run a community activity, hold a fundraiser or put on a show, come talk to us! Rates range from \$6 to \$20 an hour. We also accept time credits for some of our rooms.

**RANDOM STUFF:** We've always got random stuff on the go! From gigs and theatre productions, to political seminars and educational workshops (keep your eyes peeled for our upcoming lecture series!), there's often something for everyone going on here! The best way to keep up to date with one-off events is to either like us on facebook (just search for the Newtown Community & Cultural Centre) or sign up for our fortnightly e-newsletter by flicking us an email.

**MUMS, BUBS AND KIDS:** We have a baby friendly yoga class on Tuesdays at 10am, this is open to everyone but is particularly welcoming to parents who need to bring their young babies along. Every school holidays, we run a two week programme for local primary school aged kids, with fees as little as \$10 a day for CSC holders. Our youth programme also runs a mentor programme where local kids are matched up with young adults and hang out together on a weekly basis, providing positive role-modelling and all-round fun times, as well as an art club and a citizenship youth group. We've recently gained African Dance classes and free singing lessons for kids - all on Monday afternoons. Contact us for more details!

**HUB OF HELPFULNESS!:** Our centre is also home to a number of other great community organisations, including the Citizens Advice Bureau (with free lawyer and JP service), the Wellington Timebank (with free smiles), the Newtown Tool Library (with free tool loaning), and NiuHIB Pasifika (with free budgeting advice).
